
Our Mission













March 17th, 1997 the idea was born as a school

It all happened around "hope and faith"

Children who attend could not afford to go to other schools due to fees

Given the chance to be in school as charity by guardians





KAMPALA, UGANDA East Africa

2/3rds of the student body are disadvantaged children

No financial Aid from the Government

Funding from Ugandan non-profits and individuals

Of the current 700 students 280 are residents at the school's boarding facility

Mission of St. Kizito: To provide a quality education whereby the youth can become responsible citizens with high moral values.

All wear their hair short to prevent lice infestation


Faith and worship is extremely important Strong religious structure to the school
